CHURCH TERMS AND SYMBOLS – TRIANGLE –Only an equilateral triangle is used in ecclesiastical art because it represents the Holy Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit being equal, yet one. Usually a line drawing, the triangle may also be made of three fish, one forming each side. The Shield of the Holy Trinity is based on an inverted triangle with a small circle at each point and a larger circle in the center, joined to the small ones by double lines. The center circle is labeled "God," the others: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The lines of the triangle each say, "is not" and the bands to the center circle say "is." The Father is not the Son, and the Son is not the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit is not the Father, but each is God.

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"The Answer of Christmas"

The proof of our Christian hope is the existence of men and women who have lived by it and have radiated its joy even in dark and heartbreaking circumstances. Each of us will have known such men and women, and it is in them that Christmas is seen to be alive.

The Child born on Christmas day is set for the rising and falling of many, and when the sword of Bethlehem pierces our own souls, may it find us on the side of those who know the costly secret of Christmas joy. Merry Christmas!!

"The Other Wise Man"

We all know the story of the Three Wise Men, but we may not know the wonderful story told by Henry VanDyke, of the Other Wise Man. He too saw the star rising in the East and set out with wondrous gifts to offer the King whose birth had long been foretold. This one did not reach the young Child along with his brethren because he stopped along the way to help a sick, elderly man by the side of the road. This Other Wise Man did not find the Holy Family in Egypt, where they had fled. Instead, he saved one innocent child in Bethlehem from Herod's massacre.

The great desire of this Other Wise Man was denied, and yet in a strange way he found the One whom he sought. He knew that the Child he sought would not be found in a palace or among the rich and powerful, but feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, healing the sick, comforting the captive, and reaching out to the lost. For the light which he sought was a new light that rose out of patient and triumphant suffering.

As the years went by, he searched and used his gifts of healing and gave of his great wealth to the poor and the lowly and the oppressed. Finally, in his last act of giving when his last hope of finding the King was gone, the Other Wise Man found peace. He had done the best he could do from day to day. He had been faithful and, in the last act of love, found the King. In his searching and in his giving, the Other Wise Man of VanDyke's beautiful story became like the King he sought – offering himself in love and revealing Christ to the hungry, the naked, the sick, the captive, and the lost.

If we seek to find Christ, we too would do well to look for Him there. And the King will answer, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."


