- 3. Reports from organizations were presented. Financial report presented by Gary Zurn.
- 4. Outreach for September was split between "Food for the Poor" and "Mercy House."
- 5. Outreach for October was designated the New York Diocese for help with their recent flooding. We were unable to connect with the contact person on their website. Subsequently decided to send October outreach to the American Friends of the Diocese of Jerusalem, subject to vestry approval. They support schools and hospitals in the City of Jerusalem.

Procrastination/Service: Matthew 25:14-30 – Story of three servants "....a man going on a trip. He called together his servants and gave them money to invest.....But from those who are unfaithful, even what little they have will be taken away....."

Jesus' parable is about boldly investing the gifts God has given us. But on a secondary level it might also teach us about procrastination. The "one talent" servant buried his money in the ground because he feared failure. He couldn't bear the thought of losing the money and facing his boss. Yet tragically he found that his procrastination and fear led to a total loss anyway. Jesus is telling us we should fear wasting our talents more than we fear failure itself. What are the fears that keep you from bold action for Christ's Kingdom?


While secular values like self-promotion and competitive ladder climbing are not to be translated into spiritual life the idea of investing resources for profit is one, we are encouraged to adopt in Jesus' parable three servants receive money from their master. Each of us have received resources from God: time, ability, and opportunity. Like the servants in the parable, we can choose-- out of fear, laziness, or disinterest-- to bury our resources or we can find a way to put our gifts to work to earn a profitable return. Whether we have five "bags of gold" or only one, God expects us to invest our lives boldly in his service. Have you identified the resources he has entrusted you with?
