From Fr. Dave

Welcome April and the Easter season!

I hope that Lent was a time of growth for you. I want to thank all the folks that participated in the Lenten study of C.S. Lewis' *Screwtape Letters*. Thank you for taking up the challenge and sharing your thoughts and insights! I found it greatly rewarding and I hope you did too.

That being said, there is no one particular way for people to deepen their faith. Some do it through reading, study and discussion. Some do it through action; especially serving those whom Christ served - the poor, hungry and sick. Some do it through prayer - individual and contemplative or communal. And I'm sure I'm leaving out countless other ways we can each one of us deepen our faith.

But, how do we know? How can we be sure?

One of the terrifying morals from *Screwtape Letters* is that we can easily delude ourselves into thinking that we're serving God when, in fact, we're merely serving ourselves. To be sure, God does seek the very best for us, but God's very best is wholly contained in truly loving one another.

If there's one thing Easter demonstrates to us, it's that rarely, if ever, is "truly loving one another" easy or glamorous or rewarding in any practical, worldly sense. It's always a matter of working our hearts to love as God loves: to lift up the lowly, bind up the broken-hearted.

In a world, at a time when so much of everything surrounding us can be confusing and frightening, Easter provides a touchstone of certainty as to what God really and truly seeks and asks (but doesn't demand) of us - to love one another as Christ loved us.

Among other things, Easter is the absolutely certain "stamp of approval" from God that the ministry of Jesus Christ is exactly what God asks of God's people. As much as we can do the work that Christ did, we can be certain that we are doing God's work.

I've been privileged to see so many of you do this hard work of heart work and it is a beautiful, beautiful thing. Easter blessings to you all! Amen.

Vestry highlights for March 2018

The March meeting was abbreviated due to other activities.

- The repair of the church entry door sill plate was approved.
- Fr. David presented a proposed agreement between St. Ann's and Fr. Geoff Doolittle, who will be covering for Fr. David during his sabbatical. It was approved and signed by both wardens.
- Fr. David has been contacted by the priest at Christ Church Willard regarding a demo of our electronic organ device. It was decided to offer our old "Synthia" electronic organ device to them at no cost if they are interested.
- The Afton School student trip to Texas to help victims of the hurricanes has been cancelled. They will be returning St. Ann's donation which was to help with that trip.
- The use of the Easter offering was discussed and it was decided to send it to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Episcopal Church, in response to a request from the Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry asking churches to consider this organization for projects in the Middle East.

The Final Word



All the believers were of one heart and mind, and they felt that what they owned was not their own; they shared everything they had. And the apostles gave powerful witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and God's great favor was upon them all. There was no poverty among them, because people who owned land or houses sold them and brought the money to the apostles to give to others in need.

Acts 4:32-35

This is one of the readings suggested for the Second Sunday of Easter and if you are at all like me, you may have some difficulty with it. Think about it. **All the believers were of one heart and mind, and they felt that what they owned was not their own; they shared everything they had.** I used to think that this called for us to subscribe to Socialism or Communism. (If that troubles you, read what happens to Ananias and Sapphira. (Acts 5:1-11) However, before you go out and list your house and land with a realtor, think about what this text is saying. The people described had some basic character flaws, it was not that they were being pressured to give a certain amount. Rather it was that they were being less than honest by trying to appear that they were giving their all while in truth they were holding back for themselves some of what they had. It is this dishonest behavior in dealing with God and God's people that prevents the Holy Spirit from working effectively. May the power of God's grace give us the will and ability to discern what God would have us give of our time, our talents and our treasure in support of what He wants us to do.
