Thanks be to God, October is here! I say that just because, thanks be to God for every day we're given life in His amazing world! Certainly some days are easier than others, but every day is an amazing gift because life itself is an amazing gift.

Well, part of my life as the District Dean is to meet regularly with the other Deans and Bishop DeDe. We share information, updates, perspectives, hopes and fears. It is a blessed time.

Well, this last Deans meeting, Bishop DeDe said something that I think is crucially important to share with you all because, not just in our district but throughout most all of our diocese, many folks have the sense that we are in the midst of an unstoppable decline - sort of a slow motion avalanche of folks leaving.

Now, Bishop DeDe is amazing for many reasons, not the least of which is having a "big picture" view and sharing it with others. And so it was, that the point the Bishop made was that whatever anyone thinks about the cause of global warming and sea level rise, they are documented facts and the disruption they cause will have a very important impact on us in Central New York.

There are rock solid indicators that in the next 10, 20, 30+ years more and more people will be moving into our area. The mass population loss we've seen of the past couple decades is going to reverse and more people will be settling here. They'll have to because we have the abundant land and clean water that will become so scarce.

And the point the Bishop made about this (at least, one of her points that settled firmly in my heart) is that our churches should plan now and work toward being healthy and welcoming communities for folks to find as they seek to make their lives among us. We have an excellent opportunity now to strengthen our good habits of truly caring for one another and our communities, and to work to eliminate our bad habits of pessimism, gossip and grumbling.

In other words, the work we have to do is the work we've always had to do - continually walk in love as Christ loved us - strengthen our bonds of true friendship and see visitors and strangers as angels in disguise. Amen.



Report on the LCI Prayer Flag Day held August 25th.



My report for the LCI Prayer Flag day at Afton Sidewalk Sale - Saturday Aug 25th. First we took the plan to the Vestry for their approval and input. Vestry decided to order rubber wrist bands "God is with you" for giving out. For age 3 and under there were plush Whales "God Whaley loves you" on the tummy. Very adorable. We had cold water to hand out for free too. Each person who stopped was given a slip of paper inviting them to our Sept 16th special service. Set up the 10 x 10 canopy and 2 tables. Our young people made colorful signs that said " JOYS", "Concerns", Reflections", Sorrows", Dreams", "Hopes", and Prayers." Some of the public can be turned off by just using "Prayers" so we mixed up a lot of topics to let people know that we were wanting them to share with us as we shared with them on our own journey. We used bailing twine and strung it around the 10 x 10 canopy and had strips of fabric 2" x 18" in many colors and designs. After someone wrote on one, we had them decide where to attach it with a clothes pin. Interesting and varied reactions from young and old. One young girl wrote wishing for good grades this year in school. One young adult male wrote asking to find his way in life. Some of our own parishioners stopped by but they had mostly pre-written their prayer flags and we offered to write any messages/prayers for those who could not attend. We were well staffed by congregants - some stayed all day from 8 until 3 pm, Others stopped by for a few hours as they could. Over all we have about 55 prayer flags completed and have them strung across the ceiling of the Church inside now so we can enjoy the colors and the signs. September 16th will be a special day for us to celebrate the life of one of our dearly departed parishioners plus special prayers over the wishes and concerns people brought to us. One woman will then take her prayer flag to her daughters grave - which I find very touching. She chose a special fabric that had meaning to her for this purpose. It is interesting that some people shied away from anything CHURCH or RELIGIOUS and that others were instantly drawn in. We all heard many stories and concerns and joys as we shared or own experiences. We also had our own ambassadors who sat on a stool by the sidewalk handing out rubber band bracelets and guiding people to our table. It was Amedeo and our puppy, Ivan. They both love kids and everyone stopped to play with Ivan. The day for me was very rewarding as we were able to bond together over this activity and many ideas were combined to make the event run smoothly. It did our hearts good to be able to talk with those stepping up to open themselves up to a conversation that sometimes was not the easiest. This is what we believe the LCI is promoting - opening or doors and going out into the public. It is not easy but along the way with input and support of our wonderful parish and Father David, it was a very successful, moving experience.


