Happy and Blessed New Year!

Have you made any New Year resolutions? For complete disclosure, I don't remember the last time I made an official New Year resolution. Typically, throughout any given year, I try to develop better habits to varying degrees of success. But a few weeks ago, I got to watching some movies I hadn't seen in a long time and I got to

thinking of making a resolution.

Let me explain. The movie was The Da Vinci Code. No doubt many of you have seen it. Well, I had had a conversation with some other priests and somehow we got onto the topic of the character in the movie who wore a cilice – the spiked metal chain he wore around his thigh like a garter belt. I'd forgotten a lot about it, so I wanted to watch it again. As I watched the movie, I was impressed by how completely devoted the character with the cilice was to his idea of what God demanded from him. Now, let me be clear, this character is completely anathema to what Christian devotion is and ever should be. He was devoted to a completely perverted idea of what the Christian church – in this case, the Roman Catholic Church – calls us to be. There are and have been spiritual practices called "mortification of the flesh", but what is depicted in the movie is, to all available evidence, not based in any real practice.

But as I watched, a question formed in my head – what more could I do to prove my love of God?

But asking myself that question caused me to think about some related questions – what do I do presently to prove my love of God? What would God ask of me to prove my love for God? What did Jesus ask of his followers that they would show their love for him?

These questions prompt a great deal of reflection. But as I went through the lists of things I do and what Scripture tells us God and Jesus ask us to do, another deeper, more personal question began to take shape in my brain – Why am I not confident that I do enough to show my love of God? Why would I think I don't do enough?

I haven't fully worked through all these questions, but I have figured out one thing – all these questions are simple expressions of what love is. Love is wanting to do things to show love. Love is also a matter of wondering what more we could do to show love. Love is a powerful force in our lives. The character from Da Vinci Code never knew what real love is – a force of healing for ourselves and others, a force which forms a caring community in which the mighty and the weak, the rich and the poor, the healthy and the sick, all come together as a group thankful to God. Loving God and loving one another. I've no idea if I'll come up with a resolution, but it is good to be reminded of these things. Blessings to you all!

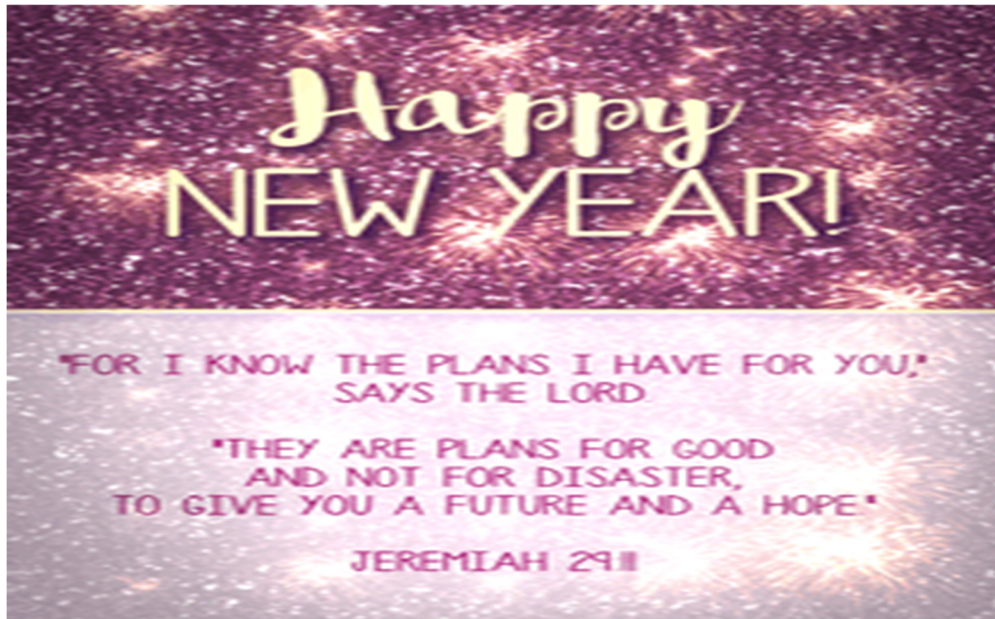

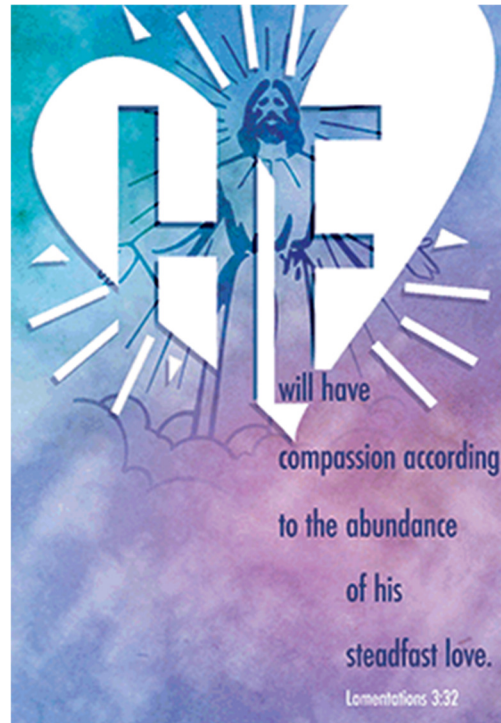
From: Forward Through the Years

Ephesians 1:16. *I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.*

We often devote all our time with God to asking for what we want. Rarely do we remember to thank him for what he has already given us. Yet it is an afflicted soul who cannot find something or someone to be thankful for, and an unusual soul who cannot find much to be thankful for. But we are so intensely conscious of what we lack and want that we overlook and take for granted what we have.

Few human relationships would long endure on such a basis. Even dear friends or parents might think it best to begin holding back their gifts until some signs of gratitude appear. But God is infinitely generous and never limits his favors to those who are properly thankful. It is not God who is injured by our ingratitude, but us.

We owe God innumerable gifts—all the way from the smallest favor to his “inestimable love in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ” (The General Thanksgiving in *The Book of Common Prayer*). Yet our thanks to him are appallingly in arrears. Let no day go by in which you do not number your causes for gratitude and voice your thankfulness in prayer.--1954



Love your enemy...really?

Martin Luther King Jr. said, "I have decided to stick with love; Hate is too heavy a burden to bear."

Hate weighs down our hearts and hopes. It costs too much. Hate poisons the wellsprings of our hearts. To emulate Jesus is to reject hate and everything that accompanies it. We do this by opening ourselves to love, especially for our enemies, and for those who see us as their enemies. Jesus reminds us that love is what makes us children of God and family to each other. This is definitely one of Jesus' difficult instructions—hard to hear and harder still to put into practice.

Love for an enemy is not automatic. Anger is easier; simmering resentment is more comfortable. Honest and vulnerable prayer for another person cuts right through our hate and resentments. Prayer compels me to see God's delight in, and affection for, the other person. Prayer for those I disagree with, and for those who disagree with me enables me to be one of God's beloved children, not God's spoiled brat! "Not easy" you say. True, but nothing worthwhile ever is. We have just celebrated the birth of Jesus with all of its excitement, joy and wonder.

Why not make a real attempt to "keep our Christmas hearts open all year." Respect and kindness to others has to start somewhere. Why not make a New Year's resolution to have it start with us.

The Final Word



(This is a reprise of a commentary that was written for the Jan. 2006 issue.)

Epiphany - 1. A feast celebrated Jan. 6th, commemorating the coming of the Magi as being the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles..

manifestation—an act of being evident to the senses, especially to the sight.

As Christians we believe that God became manifest in the person of Jesus Christ. That is, God became visible to people by taking the form of Jesus Christ, calling himself “the Light of the World.” And in the beginning of his Gospel, John says, “The light shines through the darkness, and the darkness can never extinguish it.”

Think about light. It can't be seen unless it is reflected off something, be it a particle of dust or an object like the moon.

Furthermore, in the absence of light, we are unable to see and are likely to stumble around, bumping into things and possibly injuring ourselves..

Isn't God much like that? We can see Him only when His love is reflected by others. Likewise, it is only when we live our lives based on God that others will see God in and through us. Without God, we stumble through our lives, running into things and often getting hurt.

With Jesus, the Light of the World, we are able to see, and when we see, we don't get hurt as much!
