Every month it's kind of an odd thing for me to write these letters with the future in mind. I've never been able to predict the future, so each one of these letters is written in the hopes that some big thing doesn't happen before the message gets out to you all. Not surprisingly, that's even more poignantly true this month.

I began this letter on March 17th, the day Chenango County announced its first positive Covid-19 case. I have no idea where we'll be when April rolls around. Certainly, there will be more cases. This virus will eventually work its way through the population. Our goal is to merely slow down its progress so that hospitals aren't overwhelmed.

Also, at this point, I'm not sure how we'll be continuing to share our worship together as congregations, let alone how our vestries will meet. I'm certain I'll experiment with Facebook Live and Zoom, but when we'll be able to safely gather again is anyone's guess.

Now, the big question that begs to be asked is – "Where is God in all this?"

I firmly believe that God continually seeks to communicate God's presence to us in our personal and public lives. So, where is God in all this?

I reject the idea that Covid-19 is God's punishment on us or those directly afflicted with it. Jesus himself pointed out that when the Tower of Siloam collapsed and killed people that was not God's judgment against those people (Luke 13:4). Moreover, the clear message of Jesus' ministry is that one of the main purposes of God's people is to help those in need, help those who are suffering.

It's been pointed out in other natural (or even manmade) disasters and I'm convinced it applies to this one as well – God's presence is most clearly experienced precisely where help and healing is found. So, call your neighbor – especially the elderly and isolated. Make sure they have what they need. If you are in need, please don't be so proud that you don't contact one of us and ask for help.

There is so much confusion and stress and isolation happening now that now, more than ever, we need to focus on communicating with one another. Where is God in all this? Right here, in our caring for others. Amen.

3. Delegates for this year's diocesan convention were discussed. Tracey and Betty offered to be delegates. Denise offered to be an alternate. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will be the guest speaker this year.
4. Easter offering was discussed. It was decided to divide the combined Easter and Good Friday offerings between the Berkeley Yale Episcopal Seminary and the Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.
5. The coronavirus pandemic and the response of the Episcopal Church was discussed. A hard copy mailing will be made to all parishioners after Fr. David relays information received at the upcoming conference with the Bishop and clergy.

We need you.

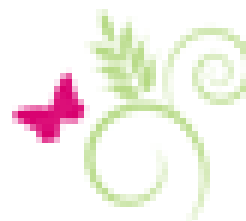
For too long we've lived lives buried on our phones. Or eyes

What is the single most important thing you can do to grow in the spiritual life? I would reply without hesitation, “Go to church at least weekly.”

There are many reasons we come up with to avoid going to church; “Sunday is my only day to relax, “That’s our family/couple time, ‘I don’t get much out of it; People aren’t friendly; I just have too much to do.” But in the end, if we are honest, they all boil down to rationalization and selfishness. Nothing is more important than going to church.

Nothing is more important because we were created to worship God, and not just individually, but communally. Our very nature as those whom God created. “knit together in our mothers’ wombs,” is to pay homage to God. Together we are to “worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness,” and with Angels and Archangels and all the company of heaven, to proclaim the glory of God’s name, “Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Hosts...”

Nothing is more important because going to church pulls us beyond our limited focus and our narrow vision. The challenge of belief, the call to love others, and the concrete experience of community, of people of different ages and needs and viewpoints, stretches us beyond ourselves. When we stop going to church or go infrequently, we cut off even the possibility of being challenged to new spiritual growth.

Nothing is more important because each time we go to church, we offer a visible witness – to the world and to the Church – of the presence of the living God. Imagine if there were no churches, or no one went, what message that would communicate. When we go to church, our example and our word (in prayer and hymn) strengthen others to receive “the Good News of God in Christ.”

Simply going to church – mere physical presence – does not insure that we will love God and our neighbor and be powerful witnesses to others. We must “go” in the full sense of “enter into.” But if we do go to church, faithfully and frequently, not giving into our excuses, we will be amazed at the growth God can work in us.
