It's February! At the end of February, we begin Lent. I hope that you all take this time to put some thought to observing Lent through considering some Lenten discipline. I know, "discipline" can be such an ugly word for some folks, but in this sense, it really is just simply resolving to make some change to your usual routine.

Some of you may recall that I sort of scoffed at making New Year's resolutions, so you might be wondering what the difference is between making New Year's resolutions and deciding upon a Lenten discipline.

Well, simply, it's the difference between time – New Year's resolutions are intended for a whole year (and possibly a lifetime) whereas Lenten disciplines are simply 40 days.

Who knows what will happen after that, whether your chosen discipline continues or not? 40 days is so much more manageable than a whole year.

And as the infomercials say, "But wait! There's more!" With Lenten disciplines you always have a weekly respite. In other words, you can have Sundays off from your discipline. Well, that is, depending upon the discipline you choose. There's come to be many different disciplines people avail themselves of and "Sundays off" really comes from the common historical practice of fasting.

You see, historically, Lenten discipline was often a matter of fasting, but Lent also calls us to other things as well. As our Ash Wednesday service puts it (Prayer Book, p. 265): "...self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word".

Now I hope it comes as no surprise that you don't get "Sundays off" from prayer, but some of these other things you can take a break from on Sundays. "Why?" you might ask. Just because every Sunday is a commemoration of Easter.

Every Sunday is a reminder and a celebration of Easter. The very first Easter Sunday, the day when Jesus Christ was resurrected and the tomb was empty, marks the first day of God's new creation and establishes God's promise that God's justice, firmly established in love, will be made manifest and present in the whole world. So, please, take on some Lenten discipline, but know that Easter is at the center of all things. Blessings to you all!

St. Ann's Vestry Synopsis January 2020

1. St. Ann's monthly outreach amount was increased to \$300 from \$200, starting this month. The Christmas offering was sent to the General Theological Seminary and was increased by the amount of our December outreach of \$200 for a total contribution of \$580.25. Many thanks to everyone for their generous Christmas offerings. A letter of thanks has been received. The January outreach of \$300 will be sent to the Episcopal Relief and Development earmarked for Puerto Rico relief.
2. Fr. David reported that Deacon Kay will be presenting an opioid program at St. Ann's, part of it in place of the sermon and the balance of it during coffee hour after the service.
3. It was voted to proceed with a repaving of the parking lot to be done by Stone Kote Construction, two coats of stone and oil.
4. Lenten bible study was discussed. It was suggested that we try holding a discussion after church during the coffee hour, instead of an evening event. Fr. David will think about what we might do.
5. It was voted to renew our membership in the Greater Afton Chamber of Commerce.

It was discussed how we might handle requests for gas money, of which there have been several in recent weeks. It was voted to re-establish a rector's discretionary fund with an initial deposit of \$200 with the funds accessible by either warden or Fr. David. Fuel purchases would be done with a voucher system. We have been requested to increase the "dwell" time on the LED sign so that the messages may be read more easily. The treasurer's report was presented and by the grace of God we are solvent.

Church Terms: **FISH – ICHTHUS** is the Greek word for “fish.” The letters of this word are the initial letters for “Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior” in Greek. It was a code---the sign of the fish--by which early Christians identified themselves to one another in the days of persecution. It also recalls the Sacrament of Holy Baptism (a fish must live in water) and is thus a symbol of Christian regeneration.

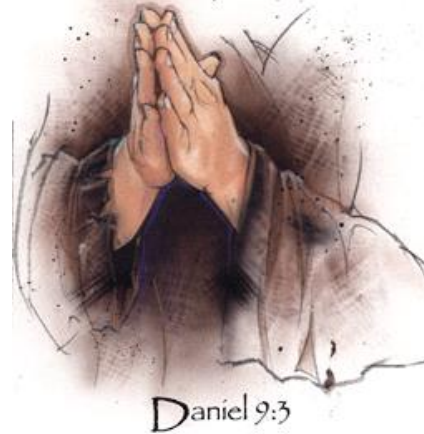

I turned to the Lord God and pleaded with him in prayer and petition, in fasting, and in sackcloth and ashes.

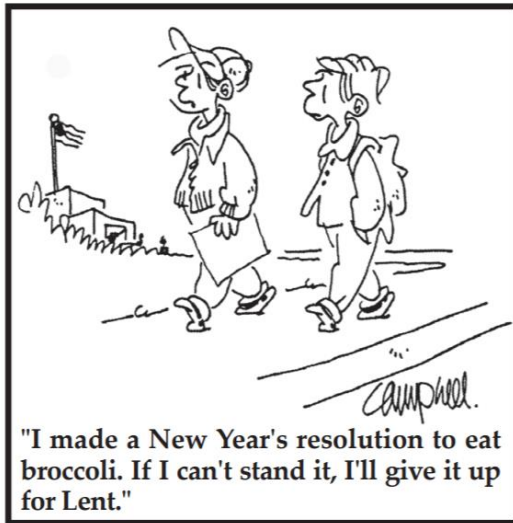


The Other 10 Commandments
