Hello folks! And blessings to you all!

October promises to be quite a transitional month. We've spent the last several months developing the technical skills to worship online and those are skills we shouldn't just let fall away. We've been able to

connect and communicate in an entirely new way and we've been able to see and pray with folks we haven't seen in quite a long while. What a blessing it has been! But, it's also been quite a blessing that Covid-19 has been held at bay in our communities and infections have remained low. As I write this, we're about 2 weeks into the new school year and still it seems that cases haven't spiked. What a blessing! Please, please, please continue to observe the recommended safety guidelines.

This month we are transitioning to worshiping in person indoors. But we're not just going back to the way things used to be; for one thing, our indoor Communion services will be considerable shorter than usual (about 30 minutes long). This month's worship schedule is complicated, so I'm going to spend the rest of my space here laying it out.

October 4<sup>th</sup> – I plan on doing my usual "solo" Morning Prayer service with PowerPoint that I record and post on our Facebook pages. At 9am, St Ann's will have in person, indoor Communion service (followed by Annual Meeting) that I will also "broadcast" on Zoom and Facebook Live. Zion and St Paul's folks are welcome to attend that service or Zion can do a 9am Morning Prayer service (but so far no one has volunteered to lead it). St Paul's will have an 11am in person, indoor Morning Prayer service.

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October 11<sup>th</sup> – I'm taking a vacation day, so I probably won't do a "solo" Morning Prayer service. Mado Cimini will lead 9am Zoom Morning Prayer. The parishes are welcome to have in person, indoor Morning Prayer services.

October 18<sup>th</sup> – Bishop's virtual visitation day! There will be no in person, indoor worship. The Bishop will lead a 9am Zoom service.

October 25<sup>th</sup> – I will do the "solo" Morning Prayer service that I record and post on our Facebook pages. At 9am there will be in person, indoor Communion at Zion. I hope to have an internet connection so I can Zoom and Livestream the service just as I plan to do on October 4<sup>th</sup> from St Ann's. If St Ann's has a volunteer, there will be in person, indoor Morning Prayer at St Ann's. At 11am there will be in person, indoor Communion at St Paul's.

NOTE: for folks who aren't yet comfortable with indoor Communion yet, I would like to visit you at your home for a short Communion from Reserved Sacrament. Contact me to make the arrangements.

UNANSWERED QUESTION: What are we to do with the community we've created on Zoom? Well, first of all, thanks to all the folks who have offered suggestions! I've thought about them and this is what I propose – Wednesday October 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> at 8am, let's do Dwelling in the Word type Bible Study. We'll spend some time together chatting, of course, but we'll also begin to pray over one of the readings for the Sunday that will follow. As we continue to find our way through this unprecedented time period, let us continue to care for one another not only by following recommended safety guidelines but also simply by recognizing that this is, indeed, an unprecedented event and there is an incredible amount of stress we're all facing.

Blessings to each one of you and may you be a blessing to others.

Yes, the "zoom" service is different, but change is what life is all about. Services are also available through the Diocese via their website.



- 1. The August & September outreach dollars were sent to The Episcopal Relief & Development organization for use in the U.S. for disaster relief. We did not hold a vestry meeting in August.
- 2. The LED lighting upgrade in the Parish Hall and Church has been completed is looks good. It is also expected to save money.
- 3. Stewardship Sunday will be held November  $8^{th}$ .
- 4. The landscaping has been completed and looks good.
- 5. Sadly, the Afton Presbyterian Church has announced that it will cease worship services at the Church.

When I hear people speak of their spiritual journeys, and I think of my own, a common theme is the periods of substantial doubt. I have come to believe that these moments are crucial to all persons, and rather than indicating a loss of faith I believe that doubt is an essential step toward faith. Those people who have the most vehement doubt often turn out to be people of tremendous faith. Thomas reminds us that we all doubt, but those doubts can lead us to belief. Like Thomas, we may struggle, but like Thomas, those struggles could well lead us to join him in saying of Jesus: "My Lord and my God!" And what is faith? A peaceful certainty that, no matter what, everything is going to be okay. Faith is believing that life (not simply existing, but, living, loving, learning----life!) is inherently good. It's believing that God loves me and wants what's best for me. It's admitting that I'm not God and so I don't always know what is best for me. If I look back through the Bible, I find that faith has had a lot more to do with stormy seas than it has had to do with calm waters. Sometimes we don't get well, or we lose our job or our marriage. Sometimes life is hard: it's a tossing and turning boat but I keep hearing this peaceful whisper: "Don't be afraid. It's okay." I'm not saying that I don't worry, or that I'm not scared or angry because I do and I am. I'm simply saying that I have moments where I know everything's okay, life is good, God's in charge, and I trust him. No matter what, everything's going to be okay. Believe it.


